What About the Fish?

Stephen Spencer, Area Fisheries Biologist for Alberta Environment and Sustainable Resource Development, will speak on the **State of Fisheries in Wabamun Lake** at the June 13 WWMC Board Meeting, 6:30 p.m. at 250 Diamond Avenue, Spruce Grove. All members welcome.

The Invasion has Started - Weeds that is!!!

You might think weeds are just something to sneeze at, but that's not the case with some of the invasive weeds that are now starting to appear at our lake. In order to not be over-run by these aggressive plants we all need to work together to deal with them. To this end **the WWMC is organizing two Invasive Weed Workshops on June 16th**: one at the Wabamun Seniors Centre from 10:00 to 11:30 a.m. and the other at the Seba Beach Heritage Pavilion from 2:00 to 3:30 p.m. The Director of the Alberta Invasive Plant Council will present the main workshop focused on general awareness and identification, with the Supervisor of Agricultural Agronomics from Parkland County to explain what's being done locally to control invasive weeds.

So who are the big bad guys we are looking for?

- Purple Loosestrife—a tall water loving plant with a spikes of reddish-purple flowers. Blooms throughout the growing season and one plant can produce over 1 million seeds. Can choke out wetlands and reed beds.
- 2. **Flowering Rush**—a cattail-like plant that produces a beautiful cluster of 20 to 40 pink through white flowers. It can quickly choke out water bodies affecting habitat for fish and wildlife not to mention making things difficult for boaters and swimmers.
- 3. **Himalayan Balsam**—often called "Poor Man's Orchid", this tall striking plant (up
 - to 3 metres high) forms dense stands that shade out other native vegetation. Each plant can produce 700-800 seeds that are dispersed up to 5 metres from the parent plant.
- 4. **Common Tansy**—more of an upland plant, this aggressive plant spreads by seeds and roots. It is toxic to humans and animals if ingested though it is generally disliked by cattle. It is another high seed producer.
- 5. **Scentless Chamomile**—typically grows in disturbed areas and is tolerant of flooding and drought. White flowers with yellow centres appear on the plant all season—with one plant producing up to 1 million seeds.

Make sure to come out to one of the workshops to learn how to identify these plants plus others and what to do once you've discovered some. The WWMC is also posting invasive weed fact sheets to their web site starting in June - see www.wwmc.ca and another good source of information is the Alberta Invasive Plant Council web site at www.invasiveplants.ab.ca that will also soon include an on-line invasive plant reporting tool.

IR Secchi Disc-Dip-in Day

Groups and individuals from the major recreational lakes in Central Alberta are



signing up to take part in the IR Secchi Disc Alberta program where they do water clarity measurements throughout the open water season as a way to judge water quality. They have also teamed up this year with the Alberta Water Quality Awareness Day program that provides kits to test water temperature, pH and oxygen. July 7th is a special "Dip-in-Day' where everyone participating in the program is encouraged to go out to test their lake to provide a snapshot of water quality for all lakes on that day. Those who are doing this testing on Wabamun Lake will be submitting their data and then publicizing an overview of lake water quality in Central Alberta as an education and discussion piece.
